SHOW TIME

You might want to check out a new female impersonator show at the Tara Supper Club at the Brandywine Hotel and Resort on Route 30 just east of Downingtown, PA. The show is entitled *Finochio* [after the famous club in San Francisco ?] and features five impersonators in a "musical comedy".

Show's big pitch is that music is "original lyrics, no lip synch". Matinees are staged on Wednesdays through Saturdays at 2 p.m. Evening performances are at 8 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday.

Tickets are \$5 for matinees and \$7 for evenings. Lunches and dinners are available, ranging from \$10 to \$17 for the dinner menu. Dinner is served 2 hours before the show except on Sunday, when dinner starts at 4 p.m. The show is scheduled to run through January.

Also, coming to the Academy of Music in Philadelphia on 30 November is the famous/infamous Les Ballets Trockadero de Monte Carlo. The group features professional ballet dancers doing takeoffs on Swan Lake, etc., using male "ballerinas". The ballet is serious, but the costuming and

characters are not always serious. A class comedy act! The time is 3 p.m., and tickets range from \$9.50 to \$22.50.
