I really don't know when I first started to enjoy dressing as a girl. All I can remember of my early childhood when I used to hear my mother say she wished I had been a girl. I am an only child. She used to dress me in little girl's clothes and say how cute I was. I guess the luxurious feel of girl's clothes never escaped me.

I remember my freshman year of high school I used to go and try on my mother's clothes when I was sure of my parents would be gone for a long while. Standing in front of a mirror and seeing the crude structure of a girl who resembled me was quite thrilling. I had just began to buy a few pieces of finery when I was called for army duty.

My first thought was how could I wear my girl's clothes at all the whole two years. I could just picture myself stuck in Viet Nam where I couldn't even buy women's apparel. But to my surprise I was sent to Hawaii where I stayed the whole 2 years.

Hawaii has a place called "The Glade" where true transvestites gather and can dress and have great fun! They also have a fabulous show. Since it is not against the law there anyone can walk down Waikiki dressed how they like, whether he maybe boy or girl or whatever. So the only ones I had to watch for was the MPS (military police.)

Unfortunately there are homosexuals there too but you can tell them right away and they respect your wishes if you are just a transvestite and not gay!

I finally one night met and talked to one of the stars of the show who really seemed concerned and helped me in my problems. She took me home with her and for the first time in my life dressed me up like a real girl.

Black corset, bra, girdle, stockings, high heels, mini skirt (low cut), and platinum wig.... She wouldn't let me see myself until she was finished but when she did... W O W! It almost took my breath away. I was beautiful. So that night we went out to town (since I had already



practiced walking and acting like a girl, it wasn't difficult to completely fool everyone. And when a doorman at the Illakai Hotel pinned an orchid on my mini dress, I felt a thrill which I can't described. When I walked into the lobby-I could feel the men's eyes staring at my legs and breasts. I had a good cleavage since I exercise my chest muscles constantly. I was in gymnastics 4 years in high school so I can practice muscle control.

After the hotel show, we went to a discothe where Sheila and I were asked to dance time and again. One boy tried to kiss me but since I am not gay I warded off his advances. But the real clincher was when I was awarded 3rd place in a dance contest they held and the manager put the spotlight on me. That was when I

knew I had achieved complete female impersonation. I felt so feminine at the moment and I wanted to cry. The night ended and after I returned every chance I could to dress again.

When I was discharged in April, 1970, I took my mustering out pay and went straight to a department store to buy clothes. I had shipped my car from Hawaii to San Francisco so I was driving home alone.

I bought a complete set of cosmetics including fake fingernails. After my car arrived I went to my motel, paid my bill and told them I would be leaving in about 2 hours.

I took a shower and put powder all over my body. I shaved my legs, under my arms; and used dermatologist wax to completely hide my eyebrows. Then I hid my manhood with a strong black girdle. Over that went a front lace corset which really



set off my breast area. Then falsies and a push up black lace bra. Next came black mesh and also pink panties. Then came a pink - see - through mini dress with ruffled sleeves, long fingernails and pink polish. I next applied all make-up and bushy black eyelashes.

To top it off a platinum blonde wig came next.

I drove through 8 states like this feeling sexier every mile. It took me 2 1/2 days, since I only stopped for some food and gas. Then just before I arrived home I stopped at a motel I had reservations at and put my sexy self back in a suitcase.

Since returning home I dress whenever I possibly can. I have no one to help me or give me pointers but it is a beautiful life.

I usually go to a motel, dress, and go out on the town in my car, taking care to evade the policemen. That is such a stupid law here.

I now have everything from black push-up bras to custom corsets.

I buy my clothes myself and always say they are for my girlfriend if they ask.

I would like to meet an understanding girl who I could dress with and be her girlfriend. But I guess for now I will just have to settle for being... Sandy!

Dear Cathy,

I unfortunately had to enter the hospital before I received your magazines -Empathy and The Transvestite. So I just got around to reading them about a week ago. I just love your magazines and I praise you for publishing such a wonderful magazines. I hope to receive many more. You stated in The Transvestite issue #30 that you could use some help with the postage bill. Well, I will volunteer a dollar and I will do most anything I'm capable of doing to help make the EMPATHY CLUB one of the best clubs going.

I read where some people ask why a TV is a TV. I've wondered that myself. I've been a TV as far back as I can remember. I used to portray the part of the Female in my dreams and solo games. I was dominated by two sisters and my mother as an excuse. I was quite shy and did not make friends easy so I was mostly a loner. I used to go to the Park or down by the lake and pretend I was a beautiful woman. The first time I ever dressed in drag was when I was about 16 years of age. I was spending the summer vacation at my uncle's farm.

This particular day my aunt and uncle had to go visit a sick friend some miles away. So they told me I would be alone and in charge of the farm until the next day. After they left which was about 10:00 A.M. I started my games as a female and got an idea... to dress in my aunt's clothes. She was a small woman very close to my size. When I go to her room and laid out the outfit that I decided to wear, I was so excited I could hardly wait till I was dressed. I stripped off all my clothes and started with a frilly pair of red with white lace trim panties, I proceeded with a back lace-up corset which was the hardest task as by that time I was so excited I was shaking. Finally I got it tied, then on with a pair of seam stockings, a blue bra filled with cotton to make a size 32 bust, a yellow full slip, white blouse with frilly collar and sleeves and a black wool shirt. I managed to get my feet into a pair of black shoes with 2" heels. There was no wig so I had to brush my hair up to look like a bob hair-do. The next thing was to apply make up. I was shaking from excitement so hard that I had to put off the make up till later when I calmed down.

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Well, I finally did get the make up on and not bad for the first time. I paraded around the house and the farm (I didn't care if the animals saw me) all day. And, that evening I changed into a white silk nightgown, leaving my pants, bra, corset and stockings on all night.

Having recently been in Seattle and met some of the club members some obvious reservations on the part of some of the club members on their ability to pass in public has prompted me to write this article. Some of the members who obviously can pass in public hesitate to do so because of one inadequately developed trait---CONFIDENCE.

I am 6'1" tall and weigh 160 lbs. and if I have the confidence to attempt to circulate among society as a female then I'm sure that there are many who are more passable than I am.

Let me give you my first attempts in writing and chances are they are the same that most novices in the art of transvestism who got out have experienced.

My feelings of inadequacy were so strong that I refused to try to pass in public without the help of someone who "knew the ropes". Fortunately I knew a transsexual in town who passed exceptionally well. I told her that I was ready to venture out if she would help me over the first difficult situations. I had all sorts of vision—people laughing, police arresting us, men beating us up, etc.

Then the first advice that I can give to you is find someone who already passes regularly and feels completely at ease in public. The next bit of advice is to, as I will describe below, go for the first few times to a gay bar.

A gay bar has certain distinct advantages, even if you are not gay. Most of us are not but the atmosphere is much more relaxed. In the big cities the bars are accustomed to "drags" coming in and most gay bars will just ignore you. This gives you exposure and starts you on your way to circulating in straight society.

I remember my first night in Portland. As we walked from the car I felt tense. It

was after nine and the music could be heard coming from the club. As we walked up to the entrance a man walked up and followed me inside. We sat down at a table and the girl I was with immediately left to see some friends she hadn't seen since her last visit to Portland. So here I was alone, scared, nervous, afraid that everyone knew that I was in reality a man.

I soon learned that the man that followed me in was not there just to have a drink; he came over to our table, although unfortunately at that time it was my table, and sat down. We started to talk he bought me a few drinks. After nearly an hour he asked me if I was really a girl. Well, you can imagine how good I felt. It was my first time out and I was passing unsuspiciously already. I told of course I was a girl. When he asked me why I was in a gay bar I told that my friend and I were lesbians. I was really laughing inside, my nervousness was rapidly being overcome by the talk and liquor.

Well, unfortunately my exuberance was short lived. Having had no experience at circulating I was not that convincing yet. He worked around until he had an opportunity to touch my face. Then he felt my beard and the masquerade was over. We laughed and had a good time the rest of the night. But, I made up my mind that night that my beard was not going to give me away again. To that end I have had over fifty percent of it removed.

But that night did something for me. It gave me that first nudge I needed, that first bit of confidence which has grown to the point where today I wear my own hair and travel, shop, dine, etc. as a woman with the confidence that even though people may look and say-"What a tall woman!"-my air, demeanor, carriage is such that I can say to myself, "Barbara, you're doing all right."

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
