## Crussdressing \& the Law



Part 5....
(C) Arather thing, I think that if a crosedresser is if public, with his wife, he ahould be quite safe even if he is under auspicion. In the company of your wife, I don't think that they waild bother you. (A) I think it would be leas likely, and I think that in the compariy of another sroezdresoer your chances of theing liastled increase astroncmically. (C) That's right. Two crossdreseera should riever go out together. (A) As I say, Hew York law doesi't afply to you if you are by yourself. It orily applies if you are with someone elet.
(Q) Would you diecuas the lawa ahout driver's licerises being illegal? (A) Usirig a fake driver's licerise is a crime. ( $Q$ ) Hell, what is a fake? (A) Arything that is different from what the secretary of State sent you in the wail. (C) You can get a false driver's liceriae, tut they would be illegal. (A) Right. Or if you altered the licenee, you know, kide get I.D.'s and borrou other's licenaes to drink. Anytime you are veirig a driver'a license that isn't your's and that is different from what the Secretary of State iseved to you is illegal. It is a crime. It is a more serious crime that this loitering law that we talleed atrout concerrifig two or more pfople. It is a misdemeanor.
(C) Sume of us have more than one name. If you get a profercional riane and don't chanze your married riame... (A) You are intitled to use any nime you want withous going through a formal name change at any time you warit as lorig as it is not being done for fraudulent purpozea. You can’t run a con gäme uasing a fraudulent name. (Q) Is it a fraud to preterid you are a womari? (A) My view is no. You are entitled to use ary riane you want in that conitext. With the exception shere the cop stops you and acks for your name. I vould be arixious theri abicut uasirg a fake name. I ould use your real riame.
(C) Aronther thing you can do is register an asoumed name with the Counity Clerk. (A) Yes, although that seeme to se to be irvitirg trouble. Its like checking into a mitel for example. You can vas any name you cant. There is no crime involved in that context. (C) One of the thinge about the driver's license, not the eame en much, is the book for sex. Have any riame yous want, but thiat box had better be the right way. (A) Arything the Secretary of State doesn't give you, you're in troutile.
(Q) There is surething about putting up a bond? (G) We can talk abcout bail if that's what you want. (C) Bail is orily after you're arreated. (Q) $l a$ there a bond you can fut uf in lieu of being arrested? (A) No. If you are arreated, there are two ways it can be l:andled. Either you can be given a desk appearance ticketi this is in New York, again, which is like a parking ticket or noving violation. They take you to the station and give you the ticket and it saye you come back on $X$ date and they let you leave. Sometimes putting up eone bail, but generally not. If they are going to require bail, they take you before court and the judge will decide what degree of tail is required. In Hew York you have to put up the full amount of bail, New York City and I believe the rest of the State. You generally only have to give the bondeman one terith if you're putting up bail throug a bail boridsman. The bondeman keefo that one tenth. He requires collateral for the other $90 \%$, sonething like a house or something. In theory, rione of you should face the bond problem and receive appearance ticketa. orily if the cup thinks that there is something furinier going on then the way you are dressed.
(Q) Can a lawyer turn you down just berause he is not a eympathizer? (A) Yes. With one exception. If you are below the poverty line and are going to be repregented by the Legal Aid Society, which provides free lawyers to people arrested, they cari't turi you down. That's the orily exception.
(Q) This is a different subject. I don't know if you are familiar with the Social Security lawô, but I am a professional advertising uriter and $I$ also do some miting under my femmena, which is a nopi-de-plunte. Is it possible for me to get a social security card unider both riames? (A) I underetand that it is not only poisible but extremely eazy. I'm not positive, but I underatand that its very easy. The Encial Security defartaient is almost unique in its utter indifference to whatever name you want to use. (C) I would like to have a joint name, with the same Social Security nuarter. (A) I don't think it a problem. It would be two riames with the same number. (C) It would be 'AK'A', also known as. (A) That would be real easy to add another name to your Social Security number. I think that it is really simple. I think that it is a short, one page form. (C) I know, because I got one (lasghiter).
(Q) So you can use another name, as long as it is not for criminal purposes. (A) Right, use any nate you vant as long as it is not for criainal purposes. (C) If you are doing business under a false name you are supposed to register it with the County Clerk. (C) I have a mail box under ory femme name, but thats not illegal. (A) I wouldn't worry about it.
(C) I'll tell you of an experience which didn't happen to me but someone I know in South Jersey. Someone was picked up on Halloween night, of all nighto, and this was in Cherry Hill which had a local ordinance. Most of us had been discrete, but she was not. She likes to show off and everything. She was in a cocmetic studio and the wnman called up the police; it was wore like a set up, anyhow. They came and picked her up and took her to the station. It is not a TRI-ESS Chapter, but GGA, and she called up the one in charge of the group and gat a lawyer for her and he had her oust. Shê got out, no bail, hut they atill gave her a hastle before they let her go.
(Q) I'm dresoed like this, now, and I go out to a restaurant to eat and I have to go to the bathroom and I can't go to the mens' ronm like this, so of course I have to $g 0$ to the ladies' room. What's the problem with that? Is it illegal? (A) No. Not by itaelf. (C) Except that it could, because of disorderly conduct. (A) Not by me, I don't see how. The disorderly conduct statutes I know I don't eee it as disorderly conduce. (C) But they arrest you for it. (A) That daren't auprise we in the olightest (laughter). Put I don't think that it's illegal. The only conceivable law that I think could be applicable sousld be indecent exposure. (C) You go into a store its hardly applicable. (A) Ita vaguely applicable. I don't know Connecticut or New Jereey, but it is such an accepted thing that I don't think that they have paseed any atatute on it. (C) A previous statement has been made to $u \varepsilon$ is that it is illegal for $u$ os to go crosedreseed into a ladies' roon, rest room or a ladies' dressing room in a etore. Do you have any knowledge of that law? (A) No. Did they tell you what law it was, the people who advised you? (C) No, ve all have approximately the same underotanding. (A) I don't think it is. I will double check. (C) I had a lawerer check into that for me and said that there was no such law. It was juast a matter of custom. They could probatily hang you for disorderly conduct, that's all. (A) Disorderly conduct is like loitering. It is one of thase things that are so vague that they will try to saljezze thinge that they cari't find anything the for under those laus. I don't think that there is af:athina under disorderly conduct that fits that situation. I don't think it is illegal.
(C) I know of cases there pecple tho vere dressed, the cope said that it was disorderly conduct just because they were drezzed. In 1940 which is a long time ago and wores have changed since then, one of the wives of one of the captaine on the airlines for which I flew - 38 arrested out in Long Ioland bacause she appeared in public in burmuda shorts (laughter). Not only was she arrested, but they took her children away from her. The children were walking on the street with her. They took the children to the Children's Home, and toak her to the police station and held her for a number of hours before her husband got home from work and bailed her out. Then she went to court and paid a fine because she waz wearing burmula shorto! (A) So, ve're making sowie progrese, I guess (laughter). Hé are waking alow progress.
(C) Years ago in the newopapers that's all yau read about, men being picked up conetantly in Netu York City for being dreased. And they used to make the front pages utien they got then. (A) I think its relatively rare custeide of the prostitution context. (C) Well, I'm talking about years ago, not todzy. Of couree you don't even see that stuff in the paper anymore. (A) Ho, and the way the Post is going they would tell you (laughter).
(Q) Would you think that it would be advantageous to our group to, perhapo, start a campaign with the police departments in New York and in New Jersey? (C) No, I don't think that we should make too many waves (laughter). ( $Q$, continued) notifying that there are people daing this and that we knciw of no laws prohibiting it? (A) Public education can't hurt. (C) 1 meant private education for the police departmente. (A) I meant that too. I don't see that it can hurt. I surpect, though, that if you are talking about Newark or New York City you vill find thell saying to you, 'why are you telling me this, I know it already', and I suapect that if you went to the New York City Police departarent for that furpoze they would eay, 'go away, we already uriderstand what the laws are and don't need you to tell us what the laws are'. You aight get a different resfonse from the Elmeford cops for example. I don't mean to keep picking on the Elmaford Police, it muet be a fine group, I' sure. (C) You mean local departments. (A) Yes. I mean then only as an example of local departments. You might very well find places with three cops and it may be very worthwhile educating them, but it seems to me that would be a much larger task. If you go to the New York City Police Department you can edurate uhomever you get to, the Commander or someone downtain, tut its not going to get out to 20,000 cops.
$\left(G_{1}\right)$ Once ufon a time when I went to the Chicage Chapter meeting of TRI-ESS we had an attorney recossiend that each of thie menhers, because of the nature of the ccipa, have a little extra cash with them because, apparently, these people were on the take. Now ! know that no attorney is really going to conte out and legally suggest that you bribe sometiody, however is it posaible, and I'm only throwing this out as a good hypothetical question, is it possible to wake a bet with a policenan for a hundred dollare, fifty, or some amount....(A) I think you are really (!) asking for it if you do aomething like that. You're at the level of a violation where you're likely to get a desk appearance ticket or likely to be sent home, or pay a fine or 80mething like that. Start talking about biritery, and we are well into misdomeanor or mabe even fellony, and then we are talking about jail time, we're talking about aerious jail time. I vouldn't do it! (C) You'll have a record for the rest of your life. (A) Right, dicaualifies you from all kinds of thinge. No, I souldn't do it. I aleo don't think its useful either in Chicago where I have lived for a long time or in New liork City. Even if it worked, for all the problemio it wiuld cause I don't think its a good idea.
(C) When it comes to the buaineas of trying to educate sometiody elefe, a man convinced againat his will is of the eame upinion, still fnotionally the sane way. And I was thinking that you call attention to something that otherwise might be aissed, in other words, you call attention to youreelf and that depending upon the type of experience and mind you duell on the thing. (A) You never know what kind of reception you're going to get when you walk into the cops cold. So if I were and Elmeford resident I wouldn't send me to educate the Elmaford cups. I wauld aend ammeone from Darien to educate the Elmaford COFa and eomeone from Elmsford to educate the Darien cops. And I agree with you completely, if someone is going to be totally hostile, they are going to be hostile and nothing that you are goirg to eay is going to change their minds. Put then I suspect that there ere going to be a fair number of peaple out there who are going to be indifferent, or ignorant, and that's the population that you can putentially gain by doing this education. (C) Put hofefully a uodern police ufficer would be trained in cirtain aspects of sociology, psychology, and a few other things and may learn for the first time about some of theose things. (A) Yes, it would the nice if wh vere certain that the cope were trained that well !laughter)."

Ctherwize, I adi trying to catch up on the correaparidarice that piled up when I decided to get the FEME HIRROR out (it is now at the priniter, $11 / 10 / 83$, Ed.). I finally decided that *e are goilig to have to pay someorie to do the typasetting. That is why the iscues have been so slow in coming. I have saved TRI-ESS thousands of dallara in typesétting costs but I just don't liave the time. Too much correspondance, etc. However, I can protatily locate someone to type on the cumposifig machine for 44 or $\$ 5$ an hour and this is etill a lot cheaper than employing a professional typesetter. I can do the paste-up arid the lettering rather quickly. It is the a-tual typesetting that puts ma behind.'

FFIMM DONTA MAFTIN (IL-011-5), NEW NAT IOHAL MEMEERSHIP DIFECTOR . . .
'Donna Martin reported on her trip to the West Coast, for consultation with Carol Peecroft. In behalf of the Chafter (CHI), our continuing 8IJPport for the national TRI-ESS organization was conveyed to Carol, along with our concern that she and Virginia Prince were trying to do too auch themigelves and needed assistance. Carol was advised that we had the resources to provide support which could include, but not be limited to, the areas of menberohip and general correspendance. Our National Officers would then be able to devote more of their time to the overall and long term objectives of TRI-ESS, rather than attendirig to the daily handling of routine and repetitive matters. Our concern about lack of regular communications from national (the FEIME MIRROR, the Directory, etc.), was alao discussed with Carol. We recognize the time constraints of family, businese, and persenal affaire ufon our National Officers which affect the time availatle for TRI-ESS matters, and feel that additional help will free more of the ir time for thase mattere which only they can handle. Carol was given a euggestion from the Chapter that an approved 'Auxiliary' asaociation be established on a national basis. Our wives and girlfriends support us as individuals, attend Chapter meetings and social affairs on a regular basis, give help in uncountable ways, but are not recognized in any way except as 'guests'.

Carol reaponded to the various commenta by agreeing that she has a 'time' problefi, and thankifig CHI Chapter for our offer of asoistance. She would certainly welcome help, but the ajarity of the work she handles (anzwering correspondance, uriting the FEMIE MIRRCR, and compiling the Directory, typezetting, pronf rizuing, etc.), requires either her persoral infut or supervision of the work being done, and there is only one other TRI-ECS meabier within driving distance of her. She has attempted to hire office help for TRI-ESS in the past, and has had tad luck. Carol agreed that the typesetting could be 'farmed out', and will attempt to hire someone for this purpose. Although the FEMME MIRROR is overdue, it is ready for the printer and should be ready for mailing shortly. As soon as the newsletter is mailed, the next project sill be an entirely new Directory. Carol agreed with our suggestion about a mational 'Alsiliary', but suggested that it be coordiriated with Gloria Ann ( W -213-W), who is working on a eimilar concept for 'couples only', but which is oriented toward separate wetkend couplea activities rather than being integrated into existing Chapter organizations.

This was a very fruitful trip, theing able to meet directly with Carol and discuse in detail many it $\in$ ms (in addition to those indicated above), of interest to CHl Chapter.
