sometimes we do well and, much to our chagrin, sometimes we do not measure up. but always, dear friends, we must look out to sea and meet a new day of our life.


who are we? men-women-people.














Some of us heard what a good job they were doing on the West Coast and decided we needed something for the paraculture in the East. We wanted a hospitable setting where we could conduct workshops and seminars, have boutiques and fashion shows, and an opportunity for an active social life 'en femme.'

Provincetown, Massachusetts, proved to be such a place, and in 1975, with a little seed money and large expectations we planned the first Fantasia Fair. The negotiations seemed endless. A few weeks before the Fair was to open, the hotel we planned to stay in declared bankruptcy. However all obstacles were surmounted, and the Fair began October 15th with 30 participants. A program included a Fashion Beauty Course, a Fashion Show, numerous mini-Boutiques, a Film Festival and the Awards Banquet. It was a huge success!


Since that year there has been a Fantasia Fair every October in Provincetown. This year will be the sixth. Symposiums, Town and Gown Suppers have been added — as has the Pool Party. 
