





Jaye's Journal By Jaye Jane Albright , Board President

This month I would like to give a plug for a new book that has been generating some dregree of controversy in our community. Samantha Atkins is a correspondent on the Transexual Menace email list who wrote about Leslie Feinberg's new hook Transgender Warriors (TW).

"I cannot express how much I like this hook. It showed quite clearly that TG people have been very much a part of the world in capacities other than poor misfortunates, or really, really wierd perverts that all too many people see us as today. It showed that we have been highly honored members of many cultures and people like us were considered a gift. The change in that thinking was traced back to the highly patriarchical cultures and in particular to the Chirstianization of the Western world. The early church used us (and gays, lesbians and other diverse groups) as targets for campaigns of hate and vilification in order to cement its power. We were especially targets as we were often the heads of competing religious institutions and highly respected in non-Christian communities."

I had picked up a copy of the book in late March in Minneapolis at the IFGF Convention and found that I totally agreed with Samantha's mini-review. I feel our community owes a hinge debt to the rare people among us, like Leslie Feinberg, who are the diligent writers and researchers and are courageous enough to speak publicly about transgender issues. I think their strength, dedication and communication skills benefit us all.

Lisa Aaronson had a different opinion, however. She wrote that she believed that we should "...put TW on a "Tranny' book list.... I'm all for that. I'd hope that most transfolk would have the maturity and morality to disregard the Marxist psychobabble, but sure, put it on a list."

Samantha replied. "Does Leslie do some of her culture analysis in terms of Marxism? Yes. So what? It does not get in the way at all in my opinion. What does come through, and what I prize is roots that allow us to hold our heads up high and stop acting like we have to beg a favorable medical diagonisis or decent treatment from others. It also gave me more grounds for considering that the treatment of TS people in particular can be seen as a medicalization of a gender balance different from the norm. Is it really sufficient to add to the old pre-treatment days when their were only to genders, and if you didn't fit ... then we will 'fix' you and make you fit? ... We can merely change from one side of the fence to the other if we satisfy the powers that be, but the fence is just as intact and just as alienating as always. This is still not respect for TG people in my opinion."

Ill bet that when you decided to deal head on with your personal gender identity issues you never guessed that you might also be making a political statement, did you? I hope you can see how in generating this healthy discussion makes us think and thinking can generate action. I want to bring this discussion back to the basic human level: Leslie Femberg now needs the community's support assistance. S/he doesn't write books for

reason. Lestie has staggering medical bills as an uninsured person with an ongoing health crisis. There is a collection being taken for Femberg at IFGE's book store in Waltham Massachusetts, and more recently, a Queer Dance Party on Samirday, June 1 at the ACL UP/GQ space in Center City. ROBERT G. INGERSOLL

At the Pride Festival on June 30th, many people asked again why we are called the Ingersoll Gender Center. Who was Ingersoll? So we thought it was about time to re-run the article below.

Robert Greene Ingersoll, for whom the Ingersoll Center was named, was a great writer and orator, a soldier, a poet, a philosopher, a benefactor and a humanitarian. It is generally said, however, that Ingersoll was a destructionist, that his philosophy was of a negative character, that he tore down and did not build up.

Never was a grosser misrepresentation ever made of a man and his labor. Only those who are not acquainted with Ingersoll and his works, only those who do not understand his purpose could make such a statement. No one had a deeper regard for humanity, no one, man or woman loved humanity more fervently; and no one did more to bring understanding and peace to humanity than this *imfidel*, this *unbeliever*. Witness below, Ingersoll's writing:

THE CREED OF SCIENCE

"To love justice, to long for the right, to love mercy, to pity the suffering, to assist the weak, to forget wrongs and remember benefits -- to love the truth; to be sincere; to utter honest words; to love liberty; to wage relentless war against slavery in all its forms; to love wife, child and friend; to make a happy home; to love the beautiful in art, in nature; to cultivate the mind to be familiar with mighty thoughts that genius has expressed, the noble deeds of all the world; to cultivate courage and cheerfulness, to make others happy; to fill life with the splendour of generous acts, the warnth of loving words; to discard error, to destroy prejudice; to receive now truths with gladness, to cultivate hope; to see the calm beyond the storm, the dawn beyond the night; to do the best that can be done and then to be resigned -- this is the religion of reason, the creed of science. This satisfies the heart and brain "

Sunday, August, 18, has been designated HIV/AIDS Awareness Sunday at Ingersoll Gender Center. In honor of that fact, we will present

IIIV AND AIDS: WHAT MEMBERS OF THE GENDER COMMUNITY SHOULD KNOW.

The Butler Did It!

What Is Worthwhile?

June 2 lst was my daughter Andrea's 30th birthday -- a fact which she, and all of us celebrated and rejoiced in. June 2 lst was also the first anniversary of the death of Thom Negri. PhD, my therapist of some seven years. I found it an interesting mix of emotions: joy at my daughter's continued progress in this world of ours, and immense sorrow at the recognition of the loss of Thom, a beautiful human being who was taken from this world way too soon.

As I was putting together this issue of *The Ingersoll Message*, I came upon a wonderful article from the Reader's Digest. It spoke volumes to me and I want to share it with you.

Anna Robertson Brown graduated from Wellesley College in 1883. She was the first woman to earn a PhD in English at the University of Pennsylvania. She was the daughter of a Presbyterian numster, and she spent part of her childhood on the western frontier. As a Wellesley alumna she became a member of Phi Beta Kappa. She also studied at Oxford and the Colege de France, daring departures for a 19th century woman.

In 1896 she married Dr. Samuel McCune Lindsay, a commissioner of education for Puerto Rico and later a prominent sociologist at Columbia University. Together they traveled the world. She produced three children and 34 books and died on March 1, 1948, at the age of 84.

In the 1890's she wrote a little book, *What Is Worthwhile?* The book was translated into Japanese, went into 73 printings, and stayed in print for 73 years. What could this 1890's author have to say to the hard-boiled and sometimes cymeal 1990's? Listen.

"We cannot possibly grasp the whole of life. What is vital? What may we profitably let go?

"Drop pretense Eternity is not for shams.

[1"Drop worry Worry is spiritual nearsightedness, a fumbling way of looking at little things, and of magnifying their value.

U"Let go of discontent. Make a heroic life out of whatever is set befor us.

"What are the things in life that we should keep, guard, use?

The wise in the use of time. The question of life is not, How much time have we'? The question is, what shall we do with it?

[]"Value work. But not any kind of work. Ask yourself: 'Is the work vital, strengthening my own character, or inspiring others, or helping the world?


"Seek happiness each day. If you are not happy today, you will never be happy! Strive to be patient, unsellich, purposeful, strong, cager and work mightily! If you do these things with a grateful hear, you will be happy

H"Cherish love. True love never nags, it trusts. Love does not have to be tethered, either in time or eteraty

"Embrace friendship. It takes a great spirit to be a true friend. One must forgive much, forget much, forbear much

| "Do not fear sorrow Disappointment in life is inevitable. Pam is the common lot. Sorrow is not given to us alone that we may mourn. It is given us that, having felt, suffered, wept, we may be able to understand love and bless."

I finished the article and put it down, thinking of Andrea and Thom. For each of them a strong belief in the goodness of life and people is/was a cornerstone of existence. Each of them, in their own way are faithful (in the literal sense of the word of "faith-full") that just around the bend there are joys and experiences that are waiting to be embraced. Sometimes, I falter in my belief in things eternal. At those times, I am like Emily Dickinson, and have to "dwell in Possibility".
