Thirty years ago a pretty, 22-year-old Adelaide woman gave birth to a beautiful little girl she named Lorraine. It was a birth that would not only make medical history but would forever change the life of mother Jean Dent.

When Lorraine was only three, Jean left for England and tearfully said goodbye to the daughter she thought she might never see again. Six years later Jean became Peter Stirling.

Tests in England proved that Jean was meant to have been a boy but a chromosome defect caused her to be born physically female. For years she struggled with feelings of self-hatred. She knew she wasn't normal and tried desperately to run away from the women to whom she became physically attracted.

"I felt so ashamed," says Peter, now 52. "I felt like a freak and it was very hard to come to terms with because I couldn't blame myself or anything else. I didn't know then what made me so different. I tried so hard to be normal--I even married and had a child to prove to the world I was like other women. But I can remember so clearly the night I stood at Lorraine's crib and begged God not to let me wake up the next day. I asked, "Why? Why do I and my little girl have to suffer like this?"

Going to Guy's Hospital in London was Jean's only hope of finding out who she was, her only chance of leading a more normal and happy life. Leaving her family and friends she faced six long years of loneliness and confusion.

Meeting Jennifer, only months before the transformation, became Peter's salvation. The two have now been married for 20 years.

"She's my life now," Peter says happily. "She is the best thing that has ever happened to me. Without her I know I would have been a very lonely man."

Peter will soon face another hurdle. He has just written a book <u>So Different</u>, which will be published this month by Simon and Schuster (rrp \$14.95).

He wrote the book to express some of the anguish he still feels and to explain how difficult it was for him to be branded "a freak". In the office of his publisher, he says: "I think it is getting to me for the first time in many years. I haven't had to talk about it for a long time now."

As a child, Peter didn't know he had a problem. But looking back he now understands why he hated playing with dolls, preferring soldiers and forts and why he turned the pram his mother gave him into a billy cart.

When he was 18 he entered the air force where he was first attracted to another woman.

"It horrified me," Peter says. "I knew it wasn't normal and I wanted to be rid of this attraction."

Jean ran away--into the arms of Robert Dent, who soon became her husband. She saw this as a way to prove to herself that she was normal.

The marriage was doomed from the start. Jean loved Robert as a friend but was repulsed by his sexual advances. For three years she tried to hide her feelings but when Lorraine was born everything started to change.

Jean began to grow hairier and her already deep voice, which she deliberately disguised for years, was becoming too deep to conceal. She knew she had to find out what was wrong with her. A doctor encouraged her to seek help in London.

Her first step was to push Lorraine towards her mother so that the separation would be less traumatic. When Lorraine started calling her grandmother "Mother", Jean felt she could leave.

"Even though it hurt, I knew I had to cultivate the relationship between Lorraine and my mother," Peter says sadly. "I knew I could never have that with my own child because I was different. I was heartbroken and I cried so much deep inside. Except for my Aunt Belle, no one knew the reason why I was going away."

Peter says he remembers how alone he felt and how scared he was being in a strange country. He rented a small flat, took a job and for the next six years set about changing his life.

"For a while I was Jean but I looked like Peter," he says. "The most traumatic time was the first day at Guy's Hospital when I had to explain why I was there."

The hospital eventually discovered, after years of tests, that Peter was born female with a uterus, ovaries, vagina and breasts but had an extra male chromosome. As he grew older he became more masculine because of a change in the balance of male and female hormones. At Guy's, Jean had a hysterectomy and a mastectomy. She also underwent male hormone therapy. Now, as Peter, he says he feels like a man in every way.

In 1974, Peter decided to come home to Australia. By this time his mother knew why he had left for England but few others did. Lorraine, then 15, had never been told and Peter's elder brother Adam didn't know.

Peter says on the day of Lorraine's 21st birthday party he asked her if she knew who he was.

"Yes," she replied, "you're Jean."

Eight years ago he gave Lorraine away at her wedding. Now Lorraine has three daughters.

Peter's mother, 85, has never talked to her son about what he has gone through. After 20 years she still refers to Peter as "she".

Peter's brother Adam has now learned of his sister's sex change but is uncomfortable with the fact that she is now a man.

Peter's book is a plea for understanding, the final test he is going to put himself through. Many of his friends only know of him as Peter and are unaware that 20 years ago he was a woman.

"I tell myself I don't care what people think but in my heart I know how hurt I will be if people turn away from me," he says.
