## THE TRANSGENDERIST

## FOR "MAN" AND BEAST, LANGUAGE OF LOVE SHARE MANY TRAITS (NY Times, 1995)

WITH the same methological methods they

have long used in studies of animals, scientists are turning their attention to the nuances of human courtship rituals -- otherwise known as flirting.

By turning the ethologist's lens on human courtship, scientists are finding striking similarities with other species, suggesting that the nonverbal template used by Homo sapiens for attracting and approaching a prospective mate is to some extent part of a larger, shared animal heritage

A woman parades past a crowded bar to the women's room, hips swaying, eyes resting momentarily on a likely man and then coyly looking

away just as she notices his look. This scenario exemplifies a standard opening move in courtship, getting attention, said Dr. David Givens, an anthropologist in Washington who is writing a book about evolution and behavior. "In the first phase of courting, humans broadcast widely a nonverbal message that amounts to 'notice me,' " said Dr. Givens. "They do it through movement, through their dress, through gesture."

From hundreds of hours of observations in bars and at parties, Dr. Givens discovered that women, more than men, tend to promenade, making numerous trips to the women's room, for instance, both to scout and to be seen.

A second nonverbal message in this earliest

stage is "I am harmless," Dr. Givens has found. The gestures and postures humans use to send this message are shared with other mammals, particularly primates. Charles Darwin, who noted the same gestures in his 1859 book, "The Expressions of the Emotions in Man and Animals," called them "submissive displays."

Perhaps the first serious study of flirting was done in the 1960's by Dr. Irenaus Eibl-Eibesfeldt, an eminent ethologist at the Max Planck Institute in Germany. Dr. Eibl-Eibesfeldt traveled to cultures around the world with a camera that took pictures from the side so he could stand near couples and take their pictures without their realizing they were being observed. In research in Samoa, Brazil, Paris, Sydney and New York, Dr. Eibl-

Eibesfeldt discovered an apparently universal nonverbal human vocabulary for flirting and courtship.

In humans, one such gesture is a palm-up placement of the hand, whether on a table or a knee, a reassuring sign of harmlessness. Another submissive display is the shoulder shrug, which, ethologists suggest, derives from an ancient vertebrate reflex, a posture signifying helplessness. A posture combining the partly shrugged shoulder and a tilted head -which displays the vulnerability of the neck -- is commonly seen when two people who are sexually drawn to each other are having their first conversation, Dr. Givens said.

Being playful and childish is another way potential lovers often communicate harmlessness. "You see the same thing in the gray wolf." said Dr. Givens.

When wolves encounter each other, they usually give a show of domi-

nance, keeping their distance. But in a sexual encounter, they become playful and frisky, "like puppies," said Dr. Givens, "so they can accept closeness." The next step is a mutual show of submission, all of which paves the way for physical intimacy.

"We still go through the ritual of courtship much like our mammalian ancestors," said Dr. Givens. "These gestures are subcortical, regulated by the more primitive part of our brain. They have nothing to do with the intellect, with our great neocortex."

The nonverbal repertoire for flirting is "part of a natural sequence for courtship worldwide," said Dr. Helen Fisher, an anthropologist at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J., and author of "The Anatomy of Love" (Fawcett, 1993). "Mothers don't teach this to their daughters."

In the long view of evolution, courtship is less about romance than about genetic fitness, the struggle to pass on the maximal number of one's own genes to future generations.

"In evolutionary terms, the payoff for each sex in parental investment differs: to produce a child a woman has an obligatory nine-month commitment, while for a man it's just one sexual act," said Dr. David Buss, a psychologist at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor and author of "The Evolution of Desire" (Basic Books, 1994). "For men in evolutionary terms what pays is sexual access to a wide variety of women, while for women it's having a man who will commit time and resources to helping raise children."

From this view, the coyness of courtship is a way to "test a prospective partner for commitment," said Dr. Jane Lancaster, an anthropologist at the University of New Mexico in Albuqerque. "Women, in particular, need to be sure they're not going to be deserted."

Coyness is not seen in species where the female does not need the sustained help or resources of a male to raise her young, said Dr. Lancaster. In species where a single act of copulation is the only contact a female requires with the father of her young, "there's a direct assertion of sexual interest by the female," said Dr. Lancaster.

But in species where two parents appreciably enhance the survival of offspring, "females don't want to mate with a male who will abandon them," said Dr. Lancaster. In such species, "the courtship dances are coy, a test to see if the male is willing to persist and pursue or simply wants a momentary dalliance," he said. "Instead of the female simply getting in a posture for mating, she repeats a promise-withdraw sequence, getting in the mating posture and then moving away."

In humans, flirtatious looks imitate this sequence. The coy look a woman gives a man is the beginning of a continuing series of approach-withdraw strategies that will unfold over the course of their courtship. These feminine stratagems signal the man, "I'm so hard to win that if you do win me you won't have to worry about me getting pregnant by another male," said Dr. Lancaster.

A taxonomy of 52 "nonverbal solicitation behaviors" observed in flirting women has been garnered by Dr. Monica Moore, a psychologist at Webster University in St. Louis. In her research, conducted in singles bars, shopping malls and other places young people go to meet those of the opposite sex, Dr.

Moore has found that the women who send flirtatious signals most frequently are most likely to be approached by men -- even more so than are women who are rated as more attractive. "It's not who's most physically appealing," said Dr. Moore, "but the woman who's signaling availability that men approach."

Flirting is the opening gambit in a continuing series of negotiations at every step of the way in courtship. Indeed, the first major negotiation point is signaled by the flirtatious look itself.

"When a man is looking at a woman and she senses it, her first decision is, 'Do I have further interest in him?' " said Dr. Beverly Palmer, a psychologist at California State University in Dominguez Hills who has studied flirting. "If so, by flirting she sends the next signal: 'I'm interested in you, and yes, you can approach me.'" Once the first conversation begins, there is "a major escalation point," said Dr. Fisher.

"The woman has a whole new basis for judging the man," she said. "A large number of prospective pickups end here."

Though men may say they are well aware of the tentativeness of flirting, Dr. Buss's findings suggest a male tendency -- at least among college-age men -- toward wishful thinking in interpreting flirtatious looks. In settings where men and women go to meet someone of the opposite sex, Dr. Buss said,

"we find that when you ask men what it means for a woman to smile at them, they interpret it as a sexual invitation."

"But when you ask women what it means," he continued, "they'll say it just indicates she wants to get to know him better."

In interviews with 208 college-age men and women published this month in The Journal of Sex Research, Dr. Buss and colleagues found that when it comes to seduction, "the sexual signals that work for a woman backfire for men."

"There's a huge sex difference in how effective different tactics are," he added.

Perhaps not surprisingly, the research showed that for women, direct sexual approaches -- dressing seductively, dancing close, staring into a man's eyes -- worked well in leading to sexual contact. But for men similar direct strategies were failures.

Instead, for men the less overtly seductive tried-and-true romantic strategems fared best. "For men the most effective approaches are displays of love and commitment," said Dr. Buss. "Telling her he really loves her, that he cares and is committed."



## The Tao of Transsexualism #1 -Enchantment

In her book <u>A Woman's Worth</u> Marianne Williamson states,

"Together we embark on a quest for our own enchantment. It will take us to a place where what is feminine is sacred, as are a lot of other things as well. <u>There</u> we can become who we are meant to be and live the life we are meant to live."<sup>1</sup> (underline added).

Welcome to the first episode of the Tao of Transsexualism. This is planned as series of Random Thoughts which from time to time in the months ahead, we will be exploring thoughts relevant to transsexual spirituality, well being and self esteem.

It has never ceased to amaze me during talks with other gender conflicted persons, how hard so many of us try to see all sides of almost any issue. It also has never ceased to amaze me how hard we try to "fit" into whatever category which the prevalent society says we need conform. Do we need to seek our own enchantment? I've never in my adult life thought of myself as enchanted, but dealing with my transsexualism has provided personal strength and spirituality through a higher understanding of faith. I've often thought that, many transsexuals, when allowed the expression, have a higher sense of spiritualism.

I have always been a fan of Winnie the Pooh. In years past I always made sure that my children had access to Pooh books and stories. Recently, I happened to purchase a taped version of Benjamin Hoff's book <u>The Tao of Pooh</u><sup>2</sup>. In it he takes a look at philosophy and spirituality through the eyes of our favorite bear and relates it to Taoism. Suprisingly many of the principles have meaning for transsexuals as well.

## The Principle of The Uncarved Block:

"Pooh looked at his two paws. He knew that one of them was the right, and he knew that when you had decided which one of them was the right, then the other one was the left. But he never knew how to begin."

Many of us in the gender community are like Pooh. We know that one gender is male, and when you had decided which gender was male, then the other one must be female, but some of us never know how to begin. Through this "not knowing" is the wisdom to just be. Pooh, after all just was...himself. By being himself he has become a lovable part of childhood for people everywhere. No apologies are offered for his unique and distinctive way of looking at things.

Later in his book Hoff further illuminates this concept further by what he calls the "Codelston Pie Principle" or as he quotes Pooh:

## "A fly can't bird, but a bird can fly."

This principle is very simple yet many overlook it, its the concept of trying to fit a square peg in a round hole. If you demand that a person defines themselves in a limiting capacity you take some of their dignity, but more than this you that something away from society. You don't need to justify yourself or your existence. Nor should you ignore the simple reality of just letting things, or in our case people, be as they are.

The uncarved block teaches us about simplicity, Codelston Pie about being ourselves. Or as Hoff puts it:

"When you discard arrogance, complexity, and a few other things that get in the way, sooner or later you will discover that simple, childlike and mysterious secret known to those who study the uncarved block: Life is fun!"

We don't know how to put it into words, although this writer and many others try, we just are -- what could be simpler?. Apparently, Pooh understood these truths and don't we all want things to be as simple as the life Pooh lived?. Maybe it's time we look at childhood with new eyes.

In the next Tao of Transsexualism: "The wise are not learned, the learned not wise".



# Transvestites Sue The Argentinian Police Force

On Thursday, February 8, A.T.A. (Argentinean Association of Transvestites) sued the Buenos Aires police force under discrimination, persecution and illegal incarceration charges.

It was announced at a press conference -covered by the country's most relevant media- where Maria Belen and Loana (A.T.A.) together with their lawyer Angela Vanni, denounced the many hardships endured by transvestites in Argentina.

\* Every night, around 100 transvestites are arrested in Buenos Aires only. It can happen anywhere - at a bar, in a shop or taxiand it is not necessarily related to prostitution. Transvestites are arrested under police edicts (unconstitutional in character, as it's the very police that promulgates them) penalizing the act of "wearing clothes that belong to the opposite sex".

\* Transvestites are verbal and physically abused by the police, and they have even been threatened with death in case they reveal those abuses.

\* Police is not allowed to keep anyone arrested for more than 10 hours in Argentina; usually, transvestites remain 24 hours in jail.

\* Many transvestites are arrested when they go to the police station to bring food or clothes for a previously arrested friend.

\* Whenever transvestites try to appeal their arbitrary detention, the appeal is usually destroyed by the police and it never gets to Court.

With this action, A.T.A.'s transvestites place themselves before society as individuals having rights of their own, in still another of their brave and dignified acts. The group has been operating for about two years. Its main activity is to fight against police brutality, but they also work intensely to raise their peers' selfesteem through consciousness and support groups and their daily presence whenever a transvestite is arrested, sick, or has been abused by her family.

Far from the stereotype -wearing simple, comfortable clothes and almost no make up-, remarkably bright, Loana is one of the group spokepersons. She is 33, partly Native American and was born in Salta - one of the most conservative Argentinean provinces. She knew from the very begining that she was, in her own words "not a man, neither a woman ... I'd say, a different kind of woman". Her childhood bore the mark of severe physical and emotional abuse; her father used to introduce the family to strangers by saying: "my daughter, my son and ...that". At 13, Loana fled from her province straight to an old house inhabited by transvestites of all ages and shapes.

Since then, she is a sexual worker. But last year she decided to quit "the streets" and studied clothes design at a public school. Many times she went directly from the police station to class, but she never stopped going. Loana graduated few months ago and know is starting to develop her own sewing/design business.

She estimates to spend an average of 4 nights "in" (arrested) and 3 "out" every week. Many times doctors refused to assist her at a public hospital because her appearance did not relate to the male name in her papers.


All those horrors she tells in a quiet manner, almost with pride: she thinks they show patriarchy's esential weakness, as it can only maintain itself through violence. But what does not forget is the pain she felt when A.T.A. was refused entrance to a feminist conference organized by ATEM (a feminist group in Buenos Aires): "We weren't going to talk. We just wanted to listen, to learn", Loana justifies herself, as if it were needed.

She and her peers study and discuss with two female anthropologists the slippery question of genders. They visit the most sordid hotels and shanty towns to bring medicines for AIDS stricken transvestites, to chat with the old ones and to teach the young that it is better to shout in a demonstration than to cut your wrists to stop being abused. Every night policemen do not have it easy: organized transvestites are always there, ready to fight every arrest as if it were their own. And as soon as they are "out", they ran to their lawyers' office to keep up the fight.

As Loana and her group actively joined the Lesbian and Gay Movement, many of us have learnt a lot about dignity, courage and humanity. We have the joy and the privilege to walk with them in their struggle. Because today they stand up as protagonists in the face of corrupt and yes, fragile, powers that beat and kill, lacking the courage to face the fact that there are many wonderful ways to be human.
