krom there it was taken to Mount Ollvet Cemetery this morning.
Hall, who had worn nome other than men's clothes, so far as the recollection of her oldest friends runneth back, was fulty dressed in the garments of her true sex. The chief mourtier at the cemetery was Minnie, the adopted daushter of the dead womsti.

Minnle sald that she who posed as "Mr." Hall was marrthit twenty-flye years ago by the Reverend Doctor Deems In the Pretbyterian Church in L.ower Sixth avenue to Celia P. Lowe, who, as Mrr. Hall, sled on July 7, 1888.

It was left to the adipted daughter to tell of this misrlage, for there was no one in the niejshborhood who could tell when or where the cercmony was jerformed.

Mmnile, who is a handsome woman, about Kr yours cld, ways the ceremony was performed on a Christmas eve. She could not telt the exact year.

Was a Factor In Polltles.
Murray Hall became a factor in politics moore than iweniy years ako, and was a member of the Tammany Hall Geaeral Committee in the virth Assembly District until about three years aso, when her uctivity censed and she was dropped. Then overtures were inade by Tommany, and Hall went over to that organiation, voting the Tammatis ticiret every year until 1900 , when III health prevented her gotrig to the polls.

"Pope Joan," who is commanily spoken of as an E:nglish girl, was credited with masquerading as a man so successtully that the wandeced to mariy lands and was nev $r$ detected. There is a gtory, now generally discreditod, that sthe hecame a Pope under the tille of John VIII.

Tbere lived twenty years ago in Hungary an offecer named Fellx Francotne, who was one of the most valorous captains in the urmy. Her sex was not discovered until atter het death.
