Dear Ann Landers:


I am a woman, past 50, employed at a bank. The young man whose desk is in front of mine has always been pleasant and considerate.

THE LIBRARY CORNER

Dear Readers,

From time to time we have asked our library "customers" to write reviews of the books they have borrowed or, at least, to tell us how they enjoyed or were displeased with them. This month, with many thanks to Diana of New Jersey, we present her comments on two books from the "self improvement" section of your library.

BE BEAUTIFUL - THE COMPLETE GUIDE TO THE ART OF MAKE-UP, by Di Biggs and Maxi Meah, copyright 1980, Chartwell Books Inc., Secaucus, New Jersey.

Girls, if any one of you have read this book, you must agree with me. Let me tell the sisters who haven't, in a quick glance, what is so marvelous about it.

First of all, the presentation is exquisite: everything, I mean: illustrations, descriptions, language, paper, format, I told you ... you'll be fascinated.

Now here's a quick glance through it from the viewpoint of most interest to us: males who need to express our feminine side by trying to emulate those persons we adore so much: women.

Let's start with 1) EQUIPMENT: a very simple description of all the sponges, tweezers, puffs, brushes, tissues, cotton balls and buds.

Then they describe the 2) FOUND-ATION: the different types such as liquid, cream and pan-stick. Then there's a quick review of 3) COS-METICS: the shades, powder, blushers, eyeshadow, eyeliner, mascara, lipsticks (pencils and gloss) and the features of your face you should cover or emphasize with these cosmetics. Of course, all of these are selected according to your hair color and style and accesories such as eyeglasses.

The chapter on 4) CARE is one we crossdressers should pay more attention to. If we really want to express our femininity, our inner, our second

self, we ought to take care of ourselves not only for the occasional
dress-up, but for the one inside us:
MOI. Therefore we must learn to use
moisturizers, cleansers, creams and
lotions, masks, manicures and pedicures and weight control. And girls,
let me tell you - within the next ten
years you will see all of these items
popularized for MEN. They are already
on the market, but the producers are
afraid or do not have enough budget to
advertise them.

Putting it 5) ALL TOGETHER. Now, according to your age, you will have the chance to examine different shapes of face with proper makeup for the occasion, be it lunch in town, a romp on the beach, breakfast with friends, a dinner date, an evening at the theatre, a shopping jaunt, etc. This is very important. We crossdressers tend to stick to one makeup combination regardless of the occasion, but real women vary their makeup to suit.

To wrap this up, you, the ones who feel the importance of doing what we all enjoy so much, please try to give the ideas in this book a chance to succeed on you. Try to practice the authors' suggestions and you will be far ahead of others and, most important, you might be able to get out of the closet with confidence. Those who are already out of the closet will feel a thousand times better.

ADRIEN ARPEL'S 3 WEEK CRASH MAKEOVER/SHAPEOVER BEAUTY PROGRAM by Adrien Arpel with Ronnie Sue Ebenstein, Rawson Associates Publishers, Inc., New York.

Many of you who enjoy dressing up have probably felt some sort of frustration at being unable to step out of the closet with a little confidence to show the world your feminine personality. Some of you may wonder to yourselves why people read you at first glance.

Girls, we must admit we are males, therefore our anatomy is quite different from females'. Thank God we have all sort of gadgets to improve the body shape and make it believable.

Some of us are gifted enough to do it naturally because of the body build. Some of us, like myself, are not so gifted and we not only have to pay extra attention to little details, but we must also exercise and diet to get our anatomy in closer shape to "theirs" without losing our maleness, O.K.? This book will teach you how to do it, step by step and from toes to head or, better said, from head to toes.

Adrien Arpel's three week beauty program will teach you how to take proper care of your hair by choosing, among other things, an adequate blow dryer and curling iron. "How about the hands? Ours are so tough." Yes, hands = nails and with the important advice we find in this book, "Frank's" hands can look masculine and well cared-for yet still be very easy to convert into beautiful "Francine's" hands. You will also learn salon techniques for manicure, how to mend broken nails, etc.

"Feet?" would you ask. They are so important especially since many people admire and take special notice of a woman's feet. So why don't we make ours pretty? Here we have a chapter dedicated to pedicure — salon style. There are also foot exercises so that wearing high heels will not result in sore feet or an aching back. We also will be able to wear beautiful sandals and precious enamel applied on

our toe mails. Isn't it thrilling? Did you say, "Aren't you forgetting the face?" Of course not, dear. Face care covers a few chapters: a) makeup, the tools, the products, how to buy them and not allowing the sales clerk to push something that we don't need. b) removal: a key element in skin care and perhaps much more important than putting the makeup on. c) Care: of your face after the fun is over. d) Cleansing: treatments for every skin structure. e) Basic makeup: the use and importance of moisturizers, underbase, cover-up, foundation, salon secrets, eye shadows, mascaras, lipsticks and gloss, your cheeks, contouring, coloring, night work, solving nature's mistakes, putting on the lashes.

To say it short: read it. Follow it's advice. After all, it takes only three weeks. You will discover a greater ability than you thought to create a beautiful woman out of a normal everyday man.

For New Members

You may be concerned, and rightly so, about protecting your identity. So are those members who have been with us for a while. CHI DELTA MU strictly follows the rules and regulations of the National organization on this matter. Your name/address will never be given to anyone without your approval. The only people who have this information are the Chapter Officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer, and Secretary), Renata who mails the newsletter, and Edith Marie who is in charge of the Library and is the Assistant Editor. These are trusted individuals who will not violate any confidence. Although at times requested, we never sell or give out our mailing list. A member who wants to write another but doesn't have an address can use the mail-forwarding service of the Chapter or that of National headquarters. names/addresses are not given out without your approval.

Some helpful hints for you as a new member are: Get to know your GAL (Geographic Area Leader), even if it is only by mail. She is your connection to the Chapter in most matters, is ready to be of assistance if she can, and can answer your questions or knows who can answer them. If you don't know who your GAL is, contact your Editor. Your GAL must meet with you prior to attending your first Chapter Meeting. Another suggestion is to get a Post Office Box for your mail. Most members have one, and it lends an extra measure of protection for you, especially if your wife is hostile or unknowing.

A suggestion if your wife is hostile, unknowing, or unsure is not to "push" her into accepting your femme self now that you've found the group. The Chapter is not out to convert anyone to crossdressing or to forcing someone to accept crossdressing. We have the resources available for a wife/girlfriend to perhaps better understand crossdressing and the needs of the crossdresser. The prime resources of the Chapter in this area are the wives/girlfriends support group and the Chapter Library. These resources are available to you and your loved-one, so make use of them as you see fit. But again, "pushing" someone is not an approach we'd recommend. Talk to others about this or write Dr. Peo for some advice.

ROGER'S NOTEBOOK

When I talk to cross-dressers, one topic seems to keep occurring and that is why do I have this need to cross-dress? Many studies have been done to try to find out why many males (and fewer females) have a strong need to be the other sex. There are many theories that try to explain this human phenomenon. From a biological point of view, there are the genetic theories -- that is there are some genetic 'defects' that 'cause' a person to strongly identify with the other sex. No genetic study has ever come up with solid proof that this is the case. Similarly there are the hormonal 'imbalance' theories which speculate that there is something 'out of balance' in the person's hormone system. Now the latter theory has been extended to include 'overdoses' of the other sex hormone during pregnancy so that the person's brain is somehow changed so it is partly (or wholly) like the other sex's brain. This is then the cause of the transgender behavior. It is known that the human male and female brains are physically different but how this determines a person's behavior or feelings is not clear.

There are also sociological theories which include the psychological aspects of human development. These theories attempt to explain cross-dressing, transsexualism and homosexuality in terms of the social forces that work on all human beings. Mostly these theories look at early development and the 'type' of parents the person had. Supposedly, the early family environment will determines gender identity and sexual partner choice. Again, these theories and the studies used to 'prove' them have been inconclusive.

In sum, while there have been many attempts to understand why there are cross-dressers, transsexuals and homosexuals, there is not any absolute understanding of why these behaviors and needs should be a part of the human condition. I view this as a very positive situation. should this be a positive situation? Wouldn't it be better if we somehow knew what caused these conditions and then we could cure them? I personally do not think that knowing the cause would either help people who are in these situations today nor would this knowledge necessarily help those yet unborn.

First, for those who are in these situations today, there is most likely little that can be done to reverse effects that took place in the womb or while they were growing up. What has happened in the past can only be accepted and lived with. For the unborn -- who makes the decision to change their environment and who is to decide what is 'normal' or acceptable behavior? If we somehow learn how to make homogeneous human beings who all think and act alike according to some standard set by a Big Sister/Brother I think the human condition will be the worse for it -- it is diversity and adversity that helps make us human.

So what do we do? We move on, understanding our strengths and learning to use these to the best of our ability. There is help for each of us. The Tri Sigma organization is one of those that provides such support. You are fortunate to be associated with it.....
